MONEY FOR SCHOOL

Soldiers always seek self-improvement. The Army offers several options for Soldiers to pursue a college education. Discipline and dedication to academic goals will lead to future success.

- •Up to \$4,500 a year in tuition assistance while in the active Army or Army Reserve
- •Eligibility for the new Post 9/11 GI bill with expanded education benefits
- •Up to \$66,852 for college using the Montgomery GI Bill and can elect for Post 9/11 GI Bill with no cap for tuition. For most colleges this would equate to approximately \$87,880
- •Up to \$65,000 to pay back qualifying student loans
- Army ROTC merit-based scholarships

RELIGIOUS ACCOMMODATIONS

Since 2009, the Army has supported religious accommodation requests requiring a waiver for uniform wear and grooming. These accommodations have largely fallen into one of three faith practices: the wear of a hijab; the wear of a beard; and the wear of a turban or under-turban/patka. As of March 2017, the Army has officially updated its wear and appearance standards to support these religious accommodations.

WAYS TO SERVE
